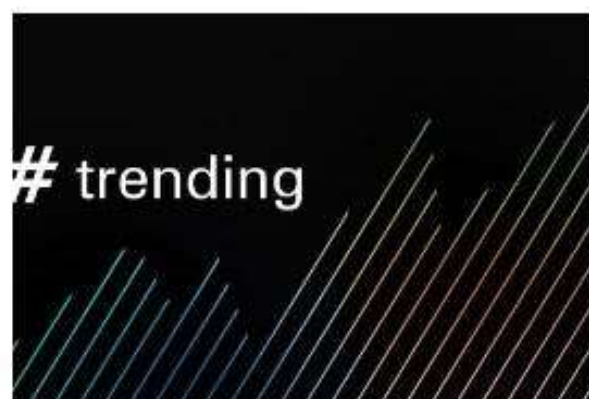
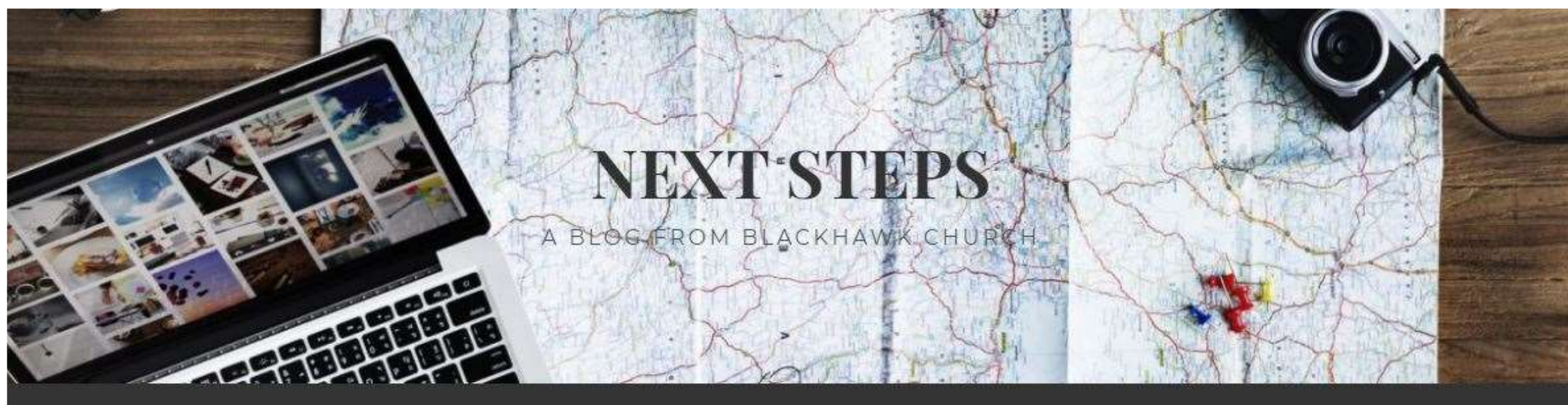

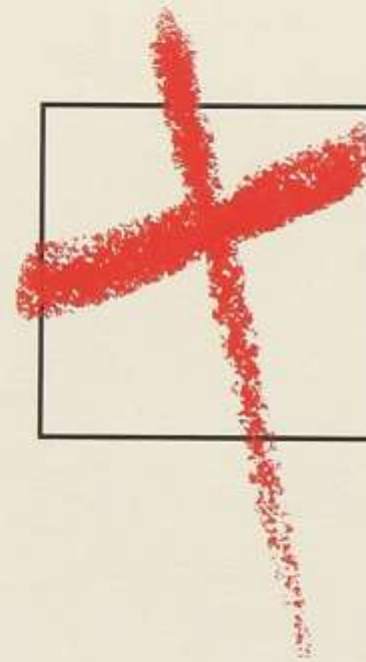
Hi Chris,
